Date: 26th January 2025, Location: Nagasaki International Association

- Thirteen people living in Nagasaki Prefecture from New Zealand, Russia, China, Vietnam, Korea, Myanmar, Laos, Kazakhstan, and Bangladesh and four Japanese people took part in the class.
- First, Saika Noguchi, director of the Sogetsu School, explained the materials, tools, and basic Ikebana or Japanese flower arrangement methods. Then, Yoko Nakano, a volunteer interpreter, translated her explanation into English. The participants tried freestyle ikebana. Every participant arranged the flowers in their own way and finished their ikebana work nicely!
- Participants commented, "It was very difficult, but it was good to learn about ikebana," "I was glad to have a good time with everyone," and so on.

on the Multicultural
Coexistence Course



The Nagasaki International Association promote the creation of a multicultural coexisting society, holding lectures for multicultural coexistence to deepen mutual understanding between Japanese and foreign residents.

"Skills Improvement Course for responding to Foreign Residents in Child-rearing Support"

Date: 20th January 2025, Location: Nagasaki City Hall

- This course was held for public health nurses and relevant people, and 45 people participated, including online.
- Nguyen Thi Hanh, Vice President of the Nagasaki Vietnamese Association and a child-rearing mother, gave a speech about the everyday problems foreign residents face and the support they would like to get.
- ■While referring to the child-rearing situation in her native Vietnam, Hanh explained that foreign residents living in Japan face "barriers" of mainly language, systems, culture and customs, and gave advice on how public health nurses should respond to these issues.

"Learning from Case Studies:

How City and Town Halls are Dealing with the Increasing Number of Foreign Residents"

Date: 4th February 2025, Location: Nagasaki Prefectural Municipal Hall

- This seminar was held for administrative staff and was attended by 22 people.
- The lecturer, Ms. Kaori Yano, gave a lecture on "Tips for communicating with foreign residents in Japanese," "Resident status," "Systems and administrative services you should know about," etc. Ms. Yano advised, "The work-related language that government employees use on a daily basis is difficult for foreign




residents to understand, so it's a good idea to replace technical terms with easy-to-understand meanings and explain them in easy Japanese."

- In the later talk session, Ms. Hanh from Vietnam and Mr. Paudel Chhetri Thakur Bahadur from Nepal also took to the stage and told the participants, "Foreign residents who speak Japanese well are not necessarily able to read and write it."
- ■In the final workshop, guests of five foreign residents living in the prefecture (from Vietnam, Nepal, Sri Lanka, New Zealand, and Egypt) also participated in it. They exchanged opinions and interacted with each other on the topic of the daily work of city and town employees, and the seminar was completed.

- ■In April 2024, Nagasaki Prefecture's first Muslim worship facility, a mosque, was opened in Kawaguchi-machi, Nagasaki City. It was recently opened by the Nagasaki Islamic Center, a non-profit organization that is a group of Muslim volunteers living in the prefecture and support Muslims.
- ■The weekly Friday prayer service called Juma has to be held in a group. So, until now, securing space for it has been an issue and they had to rent a room at a university or a community center to hold the service.
- ■Mr. Ahamed, the representative of the center, said, "Nearly 700 Muslims live in the prefecture. It is really great for us to get together and pray anytime. We also appreciate being accepted by the neighborhood. We want to make this mosque not only the place where Muslims get together but one to exchange with the



local people as 'a culture center'".

At June Culture Exchange Meeting, the culture of Islamic countries and the Islamic religion were introduced, and a meal meeting exchanging with the local people was also held.

Other tools such as labor pain card, etc. .




